LT. WALTER FRANK COLE





Walter Frank Cole Service No. 53184

Born on July 12, 1879 in Guilford, Surrey, England.

Lived in Walkerville, Ontario and worked as a steelworker.

Married with 5 children.

Sergeant in the old 21st Battalion, being connected to them for 15 years as Second Lieutenant No. 4 Company.

Enlisted as a private on November 3, 1914, Windsor, Ontario at the age of 35.

Unit: 18th Battalion - Western Ontario Regiment.

Left Halifax on April 18, 1915 aboard the S.S. Grampian, arrived in England on April 29, 1915.

Promoted to Sergeant, July 1, 1915.

Embarked for France on September 15, 1915.

Earned his Lieutenancy on the battlefield in 1916.

August 1917, injured at Boulogne, sent back to England.

Returned to France June 4, 1918 to Canadian Corps Reinforcement Camp.

Despatched to 18th Cdn. BN and joined them in the field on August 17, 1918.

Listed as wounded and missing on August 28, 1918 at the Battle of Arras. On that bloody day, the 18th Battalion lost 34 soldiers.

Confirmed killed in action in the field on September 7, 1918, telegram sent.

Buried in the British Cemetery at Visen Artois, France.




Christmas postcard sent from Lt. Cole to his daughter, Esther.

Carefully tucked in with the family photos, this beautiful embroidered postcard is in exceptional condition. One of the only remembrances that she had left of her father, Esther, who was born in 1912, kept this in a safe place all her life.


No date on the card but it would have been 1915, 1916 or 1917.



THE SCRAPBOOK OF GEORGE T. LEE - ESSEX SCOTTISH








Two exhibits were created and displayed at the 2014 Military Muster from this scrapbook - one featured the Essex Scottish from 1939 to 1944 and the other was a collection of photos from various prisoner-of-war camps.

The photo above is from Stalag IX where George was a prisoner of war. Captured at Dieppe in 1942, he was repatriated in a prisoner-of-war exchange and returned to Canada in early 1944.

In the new year, we will spend more time sharing his story in the hope of finding out more about him.


